I'm currently working on a paper that, drawing on ethnographic fieldwork in two District Attorney's offices, argues that prosecutors play an important role in the social construction of violence as they decide between violent and non-violent charges. I find that these decisions are not just based on the law, but also shaped by racialized and classed notions of what constitutes "acceptable," as opposed to illegal, forms of violence.
