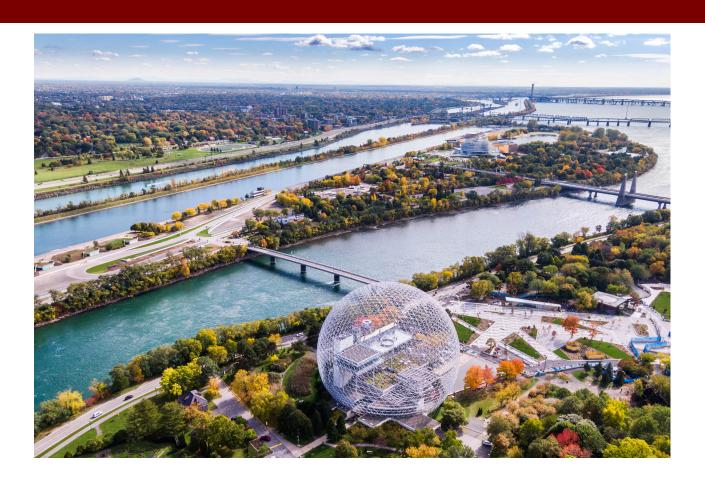

The Report

This report provides a detailed overview of submissions, decisions, and the review process. We continue the practice of framing our work from a historical perspective (going back about 10 years when feasible). Appendix 1 includes more details about the global regions from which we receive papers, general topic areas of submissions, and the methodological approaches (quantitative and qualitative) of submissions. The (comparative) data we present in the tables cover calendar years whereas team-related updates cover academic years.

The Team

The incoming editorial team includes Co-Editors Andrew S. Fullerton, Michael A. Long, Rachel M. Schmitz, and Kelley J. Sittner from the Sociology Department at Oklahoma State University (OSU). The outgoing editorial team, consisting of Co-Editors Annulla Linders (University of Cincinnati), Earl Wright II (Rhodes College), and Derrick R. Brooms (Morehouse College), began the transition in May 2024. The OSU Co-Editors also brought in Sociology department graduate students Kamala Shrestha and Syeda Barkha as Managing Editors.

The Social Media Committee headed by Mi'Chael Wright remains intact. The OSU team also appointed a new Editorial Advisory Board that will officially take effect in August 2024. See appendix 1 for a listing of the outgoing *Social Problems* team, and appendix 2 for the new editorial board.

The outgoing team published many high-quality and innovative papers that are widely cited (also within the narrow 2-year window of the Impact Factor). Please see OUP's report for more details.

Work During the Year

The OSU team is becoming well-versed in navigating the Manuscript Central system and streamlining their workflow using Microsoft Teams for shared and secure data storage and submission management documentation.

We continue working on the goal of shortening the time from submission to decision. More detail about this work can be found in the reports by OUP and the Social Media Committee.

The outgoing editorial team posted two <u>Authors' Attic</u> videos this past year, one by Sarah Combellick on <u>abortion story-telling</u> and one by Scott Duxbury on <u>big-data police</u> surveillance.

The outgoing team published <u>one virtual issue</u> on Queer Studies in Social Problems, curated by Kyle Shupe and Josh Warren. This was in conjunction with the release of an <u>Authors' Attic video</u> by stef m. shuster and Laurel Westbrook on their paper "Reducing the Joy Deficit in Sociology: A Study of Transgender Joy." Please see the OUP report for more details. Another virtual issue paired with an Authors' Attic video, on the topic of Scholarship on Policing, is set to be published in the summer of 2024.

The outgoing team's first special issue, including work inspired by W. E. B Du Bois and co-edited by Earl Wright II and Aldon Morris, was published in May of 2021. A second special issue, on the Lives (and Futures) of Black Children, guest-edited by Derrick R. Brooms and Marcelle Medford, is close to completion as papers have been selected and are currently in production. A third special issue on Racism of Omission, guest-edited by Victor Ray, Rory Kramer, and Eduardo Bonilla-Silva, is currently in the final review stage. This is the last special issue the outgoing team will pursue during their editorial term. Both special issues are planned to be published in the November 2024 issue. See <u>Table 6</u>.

Submissions

The outgoing editorial team saw an increase in submissions, from 289 in 2018 to 356 in 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic did not initially slow the pace of submissions, but once most universities began switching back to in-person teaching in the fall of 2021, the number of submissions began to drop. This slower pace continued into 2022 (except for the special issue on Racism of Omission, which attracted many additional submissions) but stabilized in 2023 and is currently on the rise for 2024. Overall, Table 2 shows that the acceptance rate, while fluctuating from year-to-year, has remained relatively stable over time and ranges from 5% to 18%, with an average of about 10-15%. Both the deflection and rejection rates vary over time and likely capture variations in editorial preferences rather than the quality of papers submitted.

Looking at the final disposition of <u>revised</u> manuscripts, <u>Table 3</u> shows extensive variation regarding the final decision, with both reject and accept decisions ranging from about 30% to 90%.

Time from Submission to Decision

One of the Journal's main goals is to continue decreasing the time from submission to decision for manuscripts we send out for review. The initial sharp drop in the time from submission to decision of **original** manuscripts was accomplished by simplifying the submission management process. See <u>Table 4</u>.

The following special issues were led by the outgoing editorial team: The special issue on contemporary uses of the Sociology of W. E. B. Du Bois, co-edited by Earl Wright II and Aldon Morris, was published in May of 2021 (68:2).

A special issue on the Lives (and Futures) of Black Children and Youth, co-edited by Derrick Brooms and Marcelle Medford, is currently under production. The latest special issue on Racism of Omission, guest-edited by Victor Ray, Rory Kramer, and Eduardo Bonilla-Silva, is also nearing completion. Both special issues will be published in November of 2024 (Vol. 71, Issue 4). See <u>Table 6 for an overview of our special issues</u>.

The outgoing editorial team worked with OUP and Mi'Chael Wright and the Social Media Committee to identify all award-winning papers and keep the <u>Award-Winning</u> <u>Articles page</u> up to date. Approximately 5-10 of the papers published each year receive awards, but not always in the year they were published. More details can be found in the Social Media Committee report.

Content Attention and Marketing

The goal of the incoming editorial team is to continue the work that the student-run Social Media Committee is doing. Thanks to the work done by Mi'Chael Wright, the social media committee chair, in collaboration with OUP, the quality and utility of the Authors' Attic videos have greatly improved under the leadership of the outgoing team. The Social Media Committee and OUP reports will have more information.

The incoming editorial team will continue working with OUP on assembling Virtual Issues (curated collections of papers previously published in the journal). This past year the outgoing team published one virtual issue on Queer Studies in Sociology, curated by Kyle Shupe and Joshua E. Warren, which included 14 papers boasting 36,210 views and 1,394 citations. The OUP report elaborates more on this.

Other Issues of Note

The *Social Problems* Editorial Team is required to organize a session during the annual SSSP meeting. The outgoing team tried several different formats – such as inviting several former *Social Problems* editors to sit on a panel, the 2021 virtual session, and finally assembling as many team members as possible to discuss publishing. This year, the incoming team of co-editors will do a panel on publishing. We are happy to share these experiences with anyone who is interested in publishing, whether in *Social Problems* or elsewhere.

Thinking About the Future

This is the final year for the outgoing team of Annulla Linders, Earl Wright II, and Derrick R. Brooms, and is the first year for the incoming team of Andrew S. Fullerton, Michael A. Long, Rachel M. Schmitz, and Kelley J. Sittner. The incoming team is excited to take the Journal's reins and continue the important work of facilitating cutting-edge research and discipline-defining scholarship.
