
2024 Annual Meeting Survey Results

With **537** attendees registered and **95** total responses, we're happy to release the results of the 2024 Annual Meeting Survey on behalf of the SSSP Administrative Office. Thank you for taking time to participate in our survey. Your responses are vital in helping SSSP to provide a valuable conference experience and to continue our mission as a social justice organization.


The survey ran for over two weeks from August 20 through September 6 with an **18% participation rate**. Please note that the participation rate is based on the total paid registrants (537). In 2024, there were 82 paid registrants that did not attend the annual meeting.

The comments have not been edited and may contain misspellings and grammatical errors. Please note that, with the exception to open ended questions, comments are only asked for when an unsatisfactory response is selected.

Literally every session I attended was behind schedule and poorly organized.


Some rooms were missing projectors. There were multiple versions of the schedule online. This meeting was chaotic.


I can't easily skim through! Old person here I guess but I want it in writing all in one place, so I can skim through, highlight things I want to attend or might want to drop in on






Was the onsite registration process satisfactory?



I appreciated that there was an option for folks to participate virtually if there was a medical reason that they were unable to attend the conference. I think it would have been helpful to expand this to include an option for those who were unable to travel internationally due to passport or visas concerns.

Again, I would suggest on-line access to sessions, particularly the SPSS business meeting and presidential address. Another suggestion is that the Accessibility Committee provide a list of companies renting scooters or wheel chairs deliverable to hotel where meetings are being held.

The only barrier to access for me was the price of registration for professors. Coming from a small institution, my access to funding is limited. If people are to participate in both SSSP and ASA, the fees amount to close to \$1000 US, and I would expect that people would choose ASA if they can't afford to go to both. The situation will be exacerbated for people who would like to attend from institutions in the Global South - not you main constituency, but I could see folks from Mexico being interested in the Society. Of course, I understand that the costs of organizing such a conference are high. They could be reduced by holding the conference in a university, like all other scholarly societies I am or have been involved with (CSA, ISA, Society for Socialist Studies). Thanks!

I did not hear anyone else read the accessibility statement.

No issues

The Sheraton hotel elevators were scary. They malfunctioned multiple times. The stairs did not lead directly to 4F where the conference was. The door to 5F through stairs was locked. Some safety concerns.

No disability room, place to go if you are over/under stimulated, soft lights, perhaps noise canceling ear phones for the room, fidget toys, etc. I'm AuDHD!

I recognize that SSSP is trying to be gender inclusive and I respect that, but as a woman with significant trauma from men, SSSP's all gender bathrooms have become a source of great anxiety for me. My advisor is a man who also attends this conference, so this adds to the stress. Every time I open the wrong bathroom door and see a urinal, I worry about accidentally walking in on him urinating, so I either risk a UTI or go out of my way to find either solo bathrooms or bathrooms that are still marked by gender. I wonder if there is another way to be more inclusive towards gender nonconforming individuals while also recognizing that many of us AFAB have traumatic experiences with men and may feel safer/more comfortable having a space where one can still assume some privacy from men. To be clear, this is not intended as a rightwing TERF thing--I fully support people using the bathroom that aligns with their gender identity. Maybe in the future the norms will shift and this arrangement will be less jarring, but in the meantime, SSSP is the only space I've seen that tries to present spaces clearly designed with gender in mind as suddenly genderless. Again, truly not trying to be bigoted, just have had one too many creepy/scary/upsetting experiences while alone with men.

This year many students, postdocs and colleagues had to withdraw their participation because of insufficient funding from their institutions. Please be aware that if we want to include these disadvantaged categories, we need to offer them possibilities for virtual participation/attendance of the meeting. These students and colleagues were both US-based and coming from the Global South and other non-US countries.

I did not notice any inequalities.




Please indicate the roles you played at the Annual Meeting.

Sessions were not that well attended this year. Disappointing. Left wondering how to improve.

Some presenters presented online but the room was not equipped for that. Auidence could hear the echo and the presider was of not much help. I think it is important to ensure presider has support to organize the event.

very few people showed up to several of the sessions. and it was extremely difficult to hear most of the presenters even though i sat close to the front row.

In general the participants are much less than expected; as a result, it is hard to generate rigorous discussions.

Only the panelists were there to listen and participate in the discussion. No one else attended and so I think this may have attended a conference where no one, outside of the panelists, attended our session. This wasn't SSSP fault, just maybe lack of interest in the topic for people attending the conference.

Too many panelists in the Dialogue session and many of the comments were chic "radical" but not practical for academics or for addressing right wing attacks. There was little time for audience participation.

There were two things that bothered me with sessions. At least two of the sessions I attended only had two of the five presenters present. It was disappointed to expect to see more papers and only have two of five presenters there. The second issue was the overall organization of the presentations. Things like people with 20 or more slides and running way over the 15 minute time limit. It is an organizational issue that seemed particularly prevalent in 2024 compared to other years. It could be this was an off year, and I just happened to step into the only panels and presentations with these issues.

In one session, the presenters did not have access to the projector. One of the members had to use their own laptop and the other presenters emailed their PowerPoint presentations to them.

some of the papers were not in a final draft so there were just not fully developed or hashed out which made the presentations undercooked.

There is very little audience attendance at SSSP sessions -- the speakers can be good, but the audience is usually tiny... disappointing...

Attendance was lacking, and engagement was generally focused on audience members who attended because they were friends with people on the panel. Its a pretty expensive trip for low attendance and low engagement.



A better turnout and engagement was expected. Less participation meant less audience and scholarly engagement

Many of the talks were basically half-baked works in progress with no data, no research question, or no argument about how the work advanced scholarship in some way. One talk appeared to be the lecture slides used to teach an undergraduate class. I realize that asking for full papers puts a burden on people, but some of these talks were very under cooked. It also seemed like some senior faculty in particular had not rehearsed or even proof read their talks. Aside from this, the organizer of my session insulted the session, the presenters, SSSP, and the audience a few times. In their opinion, the talks were weak and they expected no one to sit though them, which is a terrible thing to tell an audience and presenters. He also discussed papers at SSSP that he had rejected from this sessions. There's basically no excuse for that type of stuff.


presidential addresss and awards ceremony went way over the allotted time. plus i could not hear anything.



I recently graduated and am planning to take a break from the conference circuit for a year.


It's tough to divide time between SSSP and ASA and I generally attend ASA.






